Discussion questions for Chapter 4: 'The Non-Wisconsin Sound of Southwest Wisconsin'

We'll talk a little generally about some major dialect patterns in Wisconsin.

- 1. What are the major dialects of American English that are found within Wisconsin?
- 2. Roughly where are they spoken?
- 3. Be able to give some characteristics of each.
- 4. Do these characterizations correspond to your own sense of the parts of Wisconsin you know well? How or how not?

Then, we'll turn to this chapter on a **southwestern Wisconsin English**, especially the area around Mineral Point.

- 1. How and why is the English of southwest Wisconsin different from the English of the rest of the state?
- 2. How does that connect with patterns of immigration?
- 3. What's 'Cornish'? What language family does it belong to?
- 4. What's distinct about the English spoken in Cornwall?
- 5. What kind of evidence does Speth have for earlier speech patterns in Mineral Point?
- 6. What periods does she provide evidence on, from pre-settlement to the present? (I'll bring some sample recordings.)
- 7. How and where do 'Cornish' features show up in the recordings?
- 8. How does the type of material recorded matter? (We can talk about the broader issue of how you gather linguistic data.)
- 9. Based on that evidence, how has the dialect of Mineral Point changed over its history
- 10. What is the relationship between the perception of 'Cornish heritage' in this area and the linguistic reality on the ground today? How has that come about?
